



# Job Search: Veterans

## TRANSLATE YOUR SKILLS

Your time in the military has equipped you with a wide variety of valuable skills in leadership, technology, discipline, etc. This can be an asset on your resume if you effectively translate your military experience into civilian terms.

Focus on skills used and outcomes/successes attained rather than tasks completed. Review your NCOER to help you brainstorm skills used and outcomes achieved. Then, translate to civilian terms.

- Change "Responsible for over \$50,000 worth of equipment," to "Managed over \$50,000 worth of equipment during a 12-month deployment with no loss of inventory"
- Change "Manages and oversees all administrative actions for 130 Soldiers," to "Managed and oversaw all administrative actions for 130 personnel to ensure efficient operations"

Here are common skills used by veterans and examples of how you might communicate those skills in a bulleted format.

Leading	Training	Communicating
Facilitating	Planning	Improvising
Motivating	Adapting	Multi-tasking
Inspecting	Supervising	Evaluating
Critical thinking	Organizing	Working in team
Decision making	Managing	Working under pressure

- Trained over 20 soldiers in first aid techniques, which facilitated deployment readiness for the unit
- Demonstrated critical thinking skills daily to ensure communications equipment functioned properly
- Collaborated with a diverse team of five people for three years, succeeding through stressful work conditions

## Spell out and consider simplifying acronyms

- Use "base" instead of "FOB" or "AFB"
- Use "Supervisor" instead of "NCO"

## State your job title rather than the MOS/MOC designator

- Use "Infantry Squad Leader" instead of "11B"

## Translate technical terms to simple terms

- Use "Operations Department" instead of "S3"
- Use "Military Helicopter" instead of "AH-64"

## Include military education

- Describe program if name isn't self-explanatory
- Briefly state why the experience was valuable and any accomplishments achieved

## JOB SEARCH RESOURCES

There are employers who specifically recruit veterans. Don't limit your job search to these employers, but they are certainly a good place to start. Note what they are seeking in you as a candidate and strive to communicate those assets to other employers as well.
